Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

The faithful are also encouraged to prayerfully read the readings of Sacred Scripture for the day or to pray the rosary.

Holy Week and Easter:

We are not sure about any prediction on the Celebration of the Holy Week and Easter liturgies. We will wait until the Archbishop would direct us when the situation with COVID-19 changes.

Tithing:

Some of you have asked me about Tithing/ Sunday Contribution over the phone calls and emails. Anointing of the Sick and Sacrament of Reconciliation:

According the direction from the Archdiocese, "Whenever possible, the ministering of the sacrament of anointing of the sick and/or last rites during this time should be directed toward those who are critically ill and/or in danger of death.

When requested, the Sacrament of Penance should also be offered, but care should be taken to guide those who can postpone its celebration to do so." The confession can be offered only at the grave reason or upon an emergency purpose.

The Stations of the Cross and Rosary and Divine Mercy Chaplet can be the great ways to renew ourselves more and grow closer to God in this moment of fear and anxiety.
